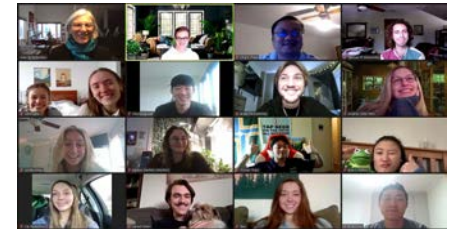

Key Research Findings & Reframing

Findings

Presence of institutionalized racism
(white youth have “treatable problems”)

Present incarceration/ treatment facilities not near public transportation

City zoning restricts location of incarceration facilities

Poverty causes severe problems for parenting

Lack of after-school activities for older youth

Need for transition to adulthood

Reframed Issue

Treatment & Prevention, not Incarceration

Community-based treatment facilities

**Not incarcerations-
Small community-based treatment**

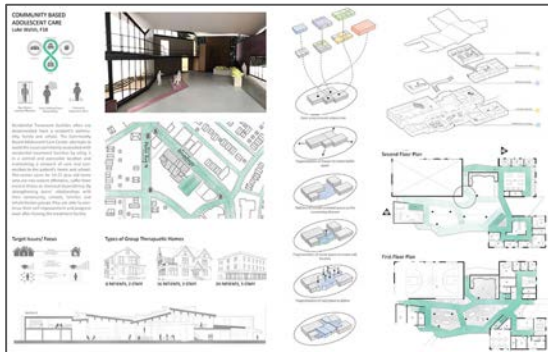

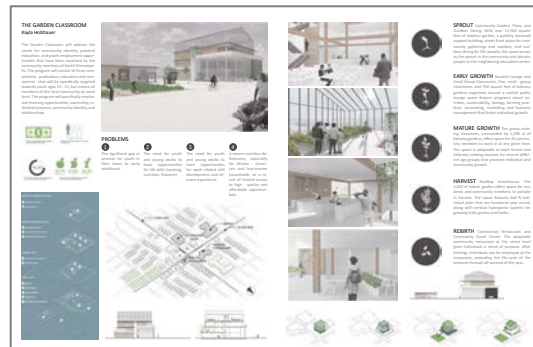

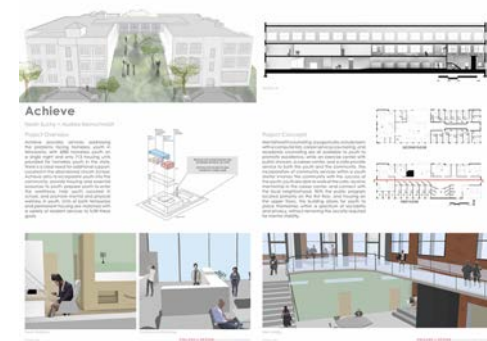
